Hanna Bogoryja-Zakrzewska



She worked for a national radio in the Reportage and Documentary Studio. For over 30 years, she made over a thousand radio reports and wrote the book "It really happened. Reporter's Tales" (together with Katarzyna Błaszczyk) published by Znak in 2019. She won all important radio awards in Poland, her works represented Polish radio on the international arena. For her work, she received the Golden Microphone and two state awards: the Bronze Cross of Merit from the President of the Republic of Poland, and the medal "Meritorious for Polish Culture" from the Minister of Culture and National Heritage. She was a member of the international Feature Group, which prepares the most important international conference for reporters, the International Feature Conference.

She believes that a well-constructed story sinks into the heart and memory of the recipient. It can teach, convince, inspire. Now she helps others create such engaging stories and conversations. So that everyone who has something interesting to say can appear in the media.

Katarzyna Błaszczyk



She worked in the largest editorial office of radio reportage in Poland. For 15 years of work, she has made over 500 reports. She was a member of the committee organizing the International Feature Conference, the world's largest documentary and podcasting conference. She is the co-author (together with Hanna, as part of the TR project) of the unique reporter book "It Happened Really. Reporters' stories. She has won about 20 awards for radio reporting. Her productions have represented Polish Radio abroad.

He believes in the power of stories. The story frees, heals, gives meaning. This applies equally to the narrator and the listener. She also supports others, I teach the difficult art of conversation and storytelling. So that everyone can tell their own story in an interesting way, or be a narrator of other people's stories. Co-author of the only textbook on the market "The Art of Conversation in a Podcast and More". He believes that podcasts are a great medium to support a brand.

She has been involved and initiated dozens of community-based initiatives in Poland, Ukraine, Belarus and other countries, mostly projects related to natural and cultural heritage protection, enhancing women and civil society development in rural and urban areas. She was a speaker at over 50 events and international conferences in Europe, the US, Africa and South-America.

The Zofia Rydet Foundation - project "Something that will stay" (2014, 2015, 2016) and the STOG Association - project "We bring back the memory of Karol Wójciak" Heródek "from Lipnica Wielka" (2016), volunteer of the 4 Alternatives Foundation. Laureate of the scholarship program of the Minister of Culture and National Heritage "Culture in the Network" in the field of "Culture management and supporting culture personnel" (2020). Katarzyna Paterek





CIESZYN SILESIA EUROREGION




The Euroregion Śląsk Cieszyński - Těšínské Slezsko was established on April 22, 1998. Its area stretches along the border of the Czech Republic and the Republic of Poland, from Hrčava and Jaworzynka to Bohumín and Chałupki. In terms of administration, it covers 60 Polish and Czech communes, where approx. 650,000 people live in the area of 1400 km². The small area of the Euroregion allows you to drive around it in less than one day. During the journey, you can see its many contrasts: mountain tops overgrown with beautiful forests exceeding the height of 1000 m above sea level. and large industrial centers; foothill and mountain villages with traditional wooden buildings and modern cities. This very interesting area in terms of sightseeing, recreation and spa, characterized by a wealth of natural and cultural heritage, has excellent conditions for practicing all forms of sustainable tourism, including ecotourism.

The main attraction of Cieszyn/Těšín Silesia is its unique architecture and folklore. The colors of wooden huts, traditional craftsmanship and folk customs preserved to this day allow visitors to the region to touch what is contemporary and at the same time refers to the past. In small, foothill villages, you can admire traditional buildings with characteristic wooden roofs, as well as folk costumes, which, depending on the place of origin, differ in details. The showpieces of some towns are beautiful wooden churches or new sacral buildings built in their place. Picturesque market squares with town halls, castles and palaces as well as monuments of technology have a completely different character.

Historical background

Cieszyn/Těšín Silesia originally belonged to the Great Moravian State. Before 991, it became part of the Polish State, and at the turn of 1289 and 1290 it obtained the status of a separate Duchy of Cieszyn/Těšín, which already in 1327 became part of the Czech crown. After the end of the Piast dynasty in 1653, the Duchy became the property of the Habsburg family. This state lasted until the disintegration of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy in 1918. At that time, a conflict arose between the newly reborn Poland and the newly created state - Czechoslovakia, which was divided on July 28, 1920 by the decision of the Council of Ambassadors of the Great Powers at the Spa Conference.



Cieszyn

Cieszyn, a city located on the border of Poland and the Czech Republic, boasts a very long and complicated history. According to the legend, the city was founded in 810 by three sons of the Polish king Leszek III. In fact, Cieszyn was founded in the 10th century as a city defending the southern border of the Polish state. An independent city developed from the surrounding borough.

At the turn of the 9th and 10th centuries, a stronghold was erected on Góra Zamkowa (Castle Mount). Soon Cieszyn/Těšín Silesia became a border area, and the stronghold became the seat of the castellan. In 1290, an independent Duchy of Cieszyn was created, which was ruled by the Piast dynasty. The city developed under their rule, experiencing a heyday in the 16th century. At that time, crafts were the basis for the inhabitants' livelihood. From the mid-sixteenth century to 1609, the dominant religion in the principality was Protestantism. In 1626 Jews settled in the town. The Thirty Years' War, which took place in the first half of the 17th century, and internal religious disputes led to the fall of Cieszyn. The Piast era ended in 1653 with the death of the last princess from the Piast dynasty. The crisis was deepened by the counter-reformation policy pursued by the next rulers of the duchy - the Habsburgs. Cieszyn began to rise from economic decline at the end of the 18th century after the construction of roads connecting it with Vienna, Krakow and Lviv, and the establishment of several manufactories in the city. In the 2nd half In the 19th century, when a railway line was built and several industrial plants were established, the period of the greatest economic development of the city began. By the beginning of the 20th century, the city had turned into a modern, cultural and educational center. Although political life was dominated by Germans, Cieszyn was the center of the Polish national movement. After the disintegration of the Habsburg Monarchy in 1918, the National Council of the Duchy of Cieszyn was established, which proclaimed that the Cieszyn land belonged to

Poland. The resulting dispute with the Czech side led in 1920 to the division of Cieszyn/Těšín Silesia. The suburbs of Cieszyn on the left bank of the Olza formed Český Těšín.

In the 1990s, Cieszyn and Český Těšín started close cooperation in various fields, implementing many joint projects.

In Cieszyn, the medieval urban layout has been preserved, there are many monuments and charming places. The unique atmosphere of the city has been created by generations of its inhabitants; of different nationalities, religions, cultures and traditions.




